## Sessions

### **A New Frontier: Using Technology to Support and Address Integrated Curriculum**

The emergence of an internet and digital culture is having a deep impact on teaching and learning. This presentation will explore the challenges faced by schools in redefining a new paradigm of learning and suggest practical ways the internet and new literacies can be integrated into teaching practices.

### **2 'All Roads Lead to Rome'**

Kay Cantwell

This presentation will explore how Information and Communication Technologies can be maximised within the information literate school community to develop life long learning skills in teachers and students. The premise suggests that ICTs should not be the centrepiece of the school curriculum, but one of multiple approaches to support the emergence of students and teachers who have 'learned how to learn'.

### **3 Managing the ICT Classroom**

Anna Kinnane

This presentation will focus on planning and designing learning opportunities for ICT integration [with emphasis on the primary school classroom]. The session will conclude with everyday classroom management tips and strategies for ICT integration that are practical and easy to implement.

### Digital Adventures with Web Quests: Problem Based Learning

29 May 07

9.15am – 3.00pm

In the last decade, educators have started to use the internet to collect & create relevant & engaging resources for their students.

These include the following types of web based resources:

- **Hot Lists** (a collection of relevant websites)
- **Knowledge Hunts** (used to develop some solid knowledge on a subject, through web pages that hold valuable information e.g. text, graphic, sound, video, etc.)
- **Subject Samplers** (a way of getting your students to feel connected to a topic and to feel that the subject matter really matters)
- **Web Quests** (inquiry-orientated group work activity that emphasizes higher order thinking using pre-defined resources from the Internet and other sources).

In this workshop, teachers will learn how to create the web based resources listed above and explore how these can enhance student learning.
